

Barber 1800 Curriculum

Subject Area
At least 100 hours of theoretical study <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Scientific fundamentals of barbering;• Hygiene and bacteriology;• Histology of the hair, skin and nerves;• Structure of the head, face and neck (anatomy and physiology);• Elementary chemistry relating to barbering sterilization and antiseptic;• Diseases of the skin, hair and glands;• Barber history;• Law pertaining to barbering;• Salesmanship, advertising, public relations, and human relations; and• Barber ethics and shop management.
At least 200 hours of scientific barbering practice <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Facial treatments (rolling cream - rest facial - packs - bleach - clay);• Shampoo treatments (plain shampoo and tonic - hot oil shampoo);• Tinting;• Bleaching;• Facial shaving;• Haircutting I (tapers);• Haircutting II (style/trend cuts);• Haircutting III (styling);• Straightening and relaxing;• Permanent waving;• Hairpieces; and• Barber implements.
At least 1200 hours of general barber practice <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Facial treatments;• Scalp treatments;• Shampoo treatments;• Tinting;• Bleaching;• Facial shaving;• Haircutting I (tapers);• Haircutting II (style/trend cuts);• Haircutting III (styling);• Hair straightening and relaxing;• Permanent waving;• Shop duties;• Shop management; and• Hair pieces.
300 hours may be allocated by the school to related theory, practice or clinic as it deems necessary.
